Women Making Waves










On July 08th, Peterborough Squadron members Leigh Mellow, Susan Mellow, Doug Hagan and Martha Scott joined Paris Marine in hosting "Women Making Waves" at McCracken's Landing on Stony Lake (in the Kawarthas). Deb and Joe from Paris Marine developed this innovative approach to coaching women new to boating in the basics of launching, vessel docking and trailering. In addition to on- the- water training offered by Joe and Deb, Peterborough Squadron gave 30 - minute sessions on basic boating safety, the importance of wearing one's Personal Flotation Device (PFD) at all times while underway, and care of life jackets for boaters of all ages and sizes. In addition, we reviewed the basic safety equipment required by Transport Canada for boats of specific sizes (lengths). The ladies were enthusiastic learners who asked great questions about boating safety.

Assistant Educational Officer Doug Hagan, a very experienced educator in our Squadron, brought along a model of a Viking sailing vessel that he built during the pandemic and used the model to demonstrate the origin of the terms starboard, larboard and port.

This was a great opportunity to showcase our squadron, and we thoroughly enjoyed the warm sunny day and the venue. Many thanks to Paris Marine for organizing this event!

10 Fun Facts About Peterborough that Masters Students know...do you???

- 1 Centennial Fountain was built in 1967 to celebrate Canada's 100th Anniversary.
- 2 The fountain shoots 76 meters (250 feet) into the air and is the highest jet fountain in Canada.
- **3** At night, the fountain is lit with coloured lights to match the current events, i.e., Pink in June to support our Dragon Boat Festival which raises funds to benefit Cancer Care at our local hospital.
- 4 Peterborough started as a sawmill and gristmill in 1818 and was known as Scott's Plains.
- 5 In 1884 Peterborough became known as the Electric City, the first city in Canada with electric streetlights and its long association with General Electric in Peterborough. (Over 7,200 lights are now being converted to LED to conserve energy consumption.)
- 6 The Lift Lock, built in 1904, is the highest hydraulic lock in the world at 65 feet (19.8 meters)
- 7 Quaker Oats invented Rolled Oats at The Peterborough headquarters; we're often known as Quakerborough.
- **8** Stompin' Tom Connors got his nickname from pounding the beat on the wooden floors of the King George Hotel in Peterborough.
- 9 Wayne Gretzky played 3 games with our Peterborough Petes hockey team but didn't score a single goal...oh well!
- 10 Peterborough was one of the first to generate hydro-electric power, even before Niagara Falls.

Weather for Boaters - Our newest Online Course Offering!

Register online for the Practical Weather Course by going to the cps-ecp.ca website and selecting the courses and course calendar tab on the left- hand side of the home page. Then select Practical Weather for Boaters and choose the Peterborough Squadron offering, scheduled to begin November 08th, 2023. There are 12 spots available.

This course is offered online using Moodle technology. Once registered, you access the course by signing into the CPS site using the username and password provided at registration. The course runs from November 08th until December 13th, with one hour review sessions each Wednesday evening from 7:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m.

The course covers topics relevant to boaters experiencing maritime weather including:

- Causes of weather patterns/ basic meteorology
 - Weather makers: air masses and fronts
- Clouds and their interpretation the Signposts of the sky
- Weather forecasting and tools/websites of interest to boaters
 - Basic symbols and terminology



Another Season of RVCC

On July 14th and 15th, RVCC Officer Ron Gernat and Commander Martha Scott travelled to Reach Harbour on beautiful Buckhorn Lake in the Kawarthas. This harbour is home port for a diverse community of boaters and numerous vessel types. Boaters ranged in experience from novices, having recently purchased their first boat, to more experienced boaters.

The Recreational Vessel Courtesy Check program (RVCC) is sponsored by Transport Canada and administered by CPS-ECP Canada to provide boaters with a way to ensure that they have on board all the required equipment for safe boating. When a boater is stopped by the OPP Maritime unit officers, they use the same checklist for safety equipment developed by Transport Canada. The safety equipment needed varies according to the length and type of vessel (commercial or recreational). Our safety checks for recreational vessels provide peace of mind for boat owners who can review their equipment, and make sure that it is operational and accessible in case of emergency.

Boat owners are provided with a sticker if the have the required equipment (good for the year of the inspection) and they also have an opportunity to upgrade their equipment and get a sticker if they are lacking anything on the list. Many thanks to Ron for his hard work in administering this program!

We thoroughly enjoyed meeting the boat owners, who were very proud of their beautiful vessels and their on-board pets.
